8 October 2020

Call to Order by President Harrison at 1900 hrs.

Pledge of Allegiance

Opening Prayer: Robert Bull Moment of Silence for POW/ MIA'S, their families and those who are serving in hazardous places around the world.

Roll Call: A quorum was established. Welcome Home Everyone! Three people attended via Zoom.

New Members: None.

Motion to approve the September Minutes as amended by Bull/

Bourne. Approved. President's Report:

We had a sale at Ann Arbor Arms. Plenty of you volunteered to help. We also had plenty of help doing the Veteran Suicide Prevention Demonstration. We are doing our work and we are doing it well.

Treasurer's Report: Bourne. Please see printed report. The major activity this month was receipt of \$5,600 in donations. So far, we have spent \$9,575 on the new shed. We have applied to get reimbursed for \$4,599 of that amount from the Ann Arbor Area Community Foundation. You'll also notice a new style balance sheet. Our next change will be to report in-kind contributions as the shed project will probably involve significant ones.

AVVA Report: Their report is printed in the *Dispatch*. More veterans wrist bracelets are on order. They will be sold for \$5 each to raise money for Fisher House Michigan. And the Agent Orange masks are available now.

Merchandise Report: Harrison: The 26 September, Ann Arbor Arms sale was a success. Bourne reports \$473 in sales, producing \$300 profit. We also collected \$59 in cash donations.

Washtenaw County Council of Veterans: Harrison. The scheduled meeting was canceled at the last minute. A replacement meeting has been tentatively set for a week from Monday.

Michigan State Council: Luker.
National tried to find a way to
interest younger veterans to learn
from us, take our mission and
assets and knowledge, but the
younger veterans say they want to
go their own way. As a result, the
National organization is a last man

standing operation. Once VVA
National closes, state and local
chapters will be able to operate
more independently, if they have
their own corporations established.
Michigan State Council would
like to see the chapters embrace
new members and would like to
help chapters learn to survive
without National's support. That
is why local strategic thinking and
planning is needed now.

Memorial Maintenance: Merritt The new lawnmower was completely paid for through donations. All four crews used it and think it is much better than the mower it replaced. The stronger motor and wider cutting path make cutting the grass a much faster job than it was before. Things are going along well, with the exception of the incident you can read about in page five of the September Dispatch. If you ever have a problem at or about the Memorial, don't bother the Township with it. Call Al or Jon and let us deal with the Township. Finally, Col Kettles' Memorial Bench has now been installed. It is covered. You may look at the bench and take pictures, but we ask that you do not share the pictures with anybody prior to the official unveiling. The bench will be unveiled at 1100 on 1 November 2020. It will be a short ceremony, with a few words by Vance McCrumb and then the unveiling.

Website: McCrumb. The website has a new page on it that highlights the 14 medical problems that the VA presumes to be caused by Agent Orange. There are links that take you to appropriate pages on the VA website about the 14 presumptive diseases.

Membership: The official number is now 208 because we added a Navy Chief.

Newsletter: Pereira. No report. **Healthcare:** Wilson. Remember to ask for the senior flu shot, if you qualify. The shot is available at the VA now.

VAAAHS: Kinzinger. No report.

Old Business: None New Business: None Good of the Order:

Wilson: The Agent Orange masks are to advertise that Agent Orange is still harming our children and that we need to understand it better so we can reduce the longterm damage. Buy a mask for \$10 and help keep a kid from suffering. Throneberry: Although PDC (which comes from the river flukes in Vietnam) is not one of the presumptive conditions, the VA has recognized that there is connection between PDC and service in Vietnam. Therefore, if you have PDC, you should file a claim. Bull: There will be an open house on 24 October from 1000 to 1700. There will be lots of support available for veterans. We are doing a more extensive publicity process for this event, so we hope we get a much better turnout. We will have free food and refreshments.

Bull: VFW 423 is opening their hall for drop-in veteran visits from 0930 to 1700 on Wednesdays and Saturdays. There is no agenda. It is an opportunity to drink coffee with other veterans, or to use the internet, or play pool and so forth. Think of it like a day room. Draper: The food drive did well, even though not many cars came through. Those that came brought many donations: 19 bankers boxes full of food along with two

drums of food as well. I want to thank those who staffed the event all day and those who donated. Thanks also goes to the Boy Scout troop that helped us.

Bourne: The gate is drawing more public attention with those two receptacles for collecting flags for retirement. But the front gate looks like it has not been painted in 10 years. That's not the kind of statement the VFW Post wants to make, I'm thinking.

Private First Class Daniel John Illi was born on December 6, 1945



to Mr. and Mrs. Erwin G. Illi at St. Joseph's hospital in Ann Arbor, Michigan. Daniel graduated from Ann Arbor High School in

1964 where he played football and was a member of the Troubleshooting Mechanics Team. Before entering the Army on November 3, 1965, Daniel was a rental manager for Liberty Land Company affiliated with Butcher and Willits Building Company of Ann Arbor. He married Shirley (Smith-Lowery) on February 5, 1966.

Daniel Illi completed his basic training at Fort Carson, Colorado and was stationed there until transferred to Vietnam on August 2, 1966. Daniel served with B Company, 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry, 1st Cavalry Division operating out of An Khe, Binh Dinh Province, South Vietnaam. Daniel was killed by small arms fire on November 1, 1966.

Daniel John Illi is survived by his high school sweetheart and wife Shirley, parents, two brothers and a sister. He lived 20 years, 10 months and 25 days. Daniel is resting in Bethlehem Cemetery in Ann Arbor, Michigan. His name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ann Arbor. He is also listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 12E Line 002.

Private First Class Donald Barrett Roddy was born on March 7, 1943 to Mr. William Roddy of Gloversville, New York and Mrs. Mary B. Woolfenden of Ann Arbor, Michigan. Donald is a 1962 graduate of Ann Arbor High



School after attending Shaker High School in Latham, New York for his freshman and sophomore years. He also attended Northern Michigan

University in Marquette, Michigan where he was a member of the Chi

Sigma Nu social fraternity. Donald entered the Army on January 13, 1965.

Private First Class Roddy began his tour of duty in South Vietnam on August 18, 1965 serving as an infantryman with B Company, 1st Battalion, 7th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division. Donald was killed on November 15, 1965 as a result of enemy small arms fire during the Battle for the la Drang Valley. According to an Ann Arbor Newspaper article written by Gary Lillie, "Taking part in the first battle of LZ X-Ray, was Pfc. Donald B. Roddy, a 1962 graduate of Ann Arbor High School. As a member of the 'Lost Patrol' of Bravo Company, 1st Battalion, 7th Cavalry, he lost his life along with the rest of his machine-gun crew as they fought to cover the withdrawal of their fellow troopers to safer ground." The account can be found on page 87 (We Were Soldiers Once...and Young by Joseph L. Galloway and Lt. Gen. Harold G. Moore). Donald was posthumously awarded the Bronze Star Medal.

Donald Barrett Roddy is survived by his parents, his stepfather, and a brother. He lived 22 years, 8 months and 8 days. Donald's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ann Arbor. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial

> in Washington, DC on Panel 03E Line 061.

Private First Class Robert Allen Albertson was born on January 1, 1947 in Ypsilanti, Michigan to Mr. and Mrs. Vern Albertson. Robert graduated from Ypsilanti High School in 1966. He worked at the Ypsilanti Plant of the Ford Motor Company prior to entering service in the Army on May 3, 1966.

Private First Class Robert Allen Albertson started his tour of duty in South Vietnam on October 11, 1967 serving as an infantryman with A Company, First Battalion, 8th Cavalry, First Cavalry Division. Robert died as a result of small arms fire on November 4, 1967 after being In-Country for only 23 days.

Robert Albertson is survived by his wife, parents and two brothers. Robert lived 20 years, 10 months and 3 days. He is resting in Highland Cemetery in Ypsilanti, Michigan. His name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial located in Ypsilanti Township under Ypsilanti. Robert's name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 29E Line 018.

Robert Clarence Skinner was born on June 21, 1951.

Private First Class Skinner began his tour of duty in Quang Nam Province, South Vietnam on September 27, 1969 serving as a Motor Vehicle Operator with Headquarters and Service Company, 1st Shore Party Battalion, 1st Marine Division, III Marine Amphibious Forces. Robert was killed on November 16, 1969.

According to a posting left by Sergeant Eddie G. Hammonds, Jr., "I served with PFC Skinner in Vietnam. He was killed on his first night patrol. I will never forget the night or his courageous valor. You will not be forgotten, because I remember."

Robert Clarence Skinner lived 18 years, 4 months and 25 days. He is resting in the Platte Township Cemetery, Benzie County, Michigan. Robert's name is listed

He is resting in the Riverside Cemetery in Clinton, Michigan. Rickie's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Manchester. His name also ap-pears



on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 30E Line 019.

Engineman Third Class Kushmaul entered the Navy on Feb-ruary 2, 1967. He began his tour of duty in Kien Giang Province, South Vietnam on February 15, 1969 serving with Patrol Boat River 8131, Task Force 116, United States Naval Forces Vietnam. He was killed while on a river boat patroling on the Song Hkau Giang River South of Siagon on November 16, 1969 from a rocket

explosion.

Robert Edward Kushmaul, Jr. is survived by his parents, a brother and a sister. He lived 21 years, 3 months and 7 days. He is resting in Oak Grove Cemetery in Chelsea, Michigan. Robert's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Chelsea. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 16W Line 084.

Legislation Action! Please take action and support Tester/ Harder Amendment in the FY2021 National Defense Authorization Act.

October 26, 2020

The House and Senate Armed Services committee will soon meet to reconcile legislative differences in the House (H.R. 6395) and Senate (S.4049) version of the FY 2021 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) recently passed in both chambers.

Vietnam Veterans of America joins Congressman Josh Harder (D-10th-CA) in his push to conferees--the Honorable Adam Smith, Chairman, Armed Services Committee; Mac Thornberry, Ranking member, House Armed Services Committee; Senator
James Inhofe, Chairman, Senate
Armed Services Committee;
and Jack Reed, Ranking
Member, Senate Armed Services
Committee--to retain the bipartisan
Harder/Tester amendment
that would add three diseases,
bladder cancer, hypothyroidism,
and Parkinsonism as serviceconnected conditions.

Each of these diseases has met the scientific threshold of the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine, to be credibly linked to Agent Orange. What remains is the addition of these conditions to the list of Agent Orange-presumptive diseases.

Our Vietnam veterans should not have to wait any longer for the recognition they deserve and the benefits they are owed. Ensuring this bipartisan and bicameral amendment remains in the final NDAA bill will mean that thousands of veterans will finally get the support they need for putting on the uniform and honorably defending this great nation

VVA thanks Congressman Harder for his leadership on this issue.

As a senior citizen was driving down the freeway, his car phone rang.

Answering, he heard his wife's voice urgently warning him:
