shouldn't take that step unless the
concrete people are ready to fill
the holes soon. The contractor we
were counting on has already shut
down operations for the season,
Diversified Excavating is checking
to see if they can find somebody
for us.

Newsletter: Pereira. No report.
Healthcare: Wilson, Congress
has passed the National Defense
Authorization Act. It is waiting
for the President's signature.
He has threatened to veto it.
The bill contains an amendment
that would put Bladder Cancer,
Hypothyroidism and Parkinsonism
on the list of Agent Orange
Presumptive Conditions.

VAAAHS: Kinzinger: We can't do our usual in-person activities due to health restrictions. Embroidered shirts are ready to be delivered to the VA. The nursing staff will be called down to the lobby to take shirts up to their patients. It will be the same for the underwear giveaway. I'll get the word out when it is time to haul underwear

to the VA.

Old Business: None New Business: None Good of the Order:

Perrault, There is a picture of the 2007 National Convention in The VVA Veteran Digest publication (Nov/Dec 2020), precisely the year when John Kinzinger was awarded National Member of the Year. We had also been working on having the VA let us use the Welcome Center as a location for our merchandise sales. Instead, the VA is now in the process of moving MyHealthEVet and the media center to that location. Bull, First, the Cans for Veterans program has produced over \$1,000 of support for veterans so far. Second, as requested by various facilities, we are restarting the Cards for Veterans program. If you send me your letters in an email, I will pass them along to the facilities that will distribute them. to servicemembers and veterans. The guidelines are that it can be any length (from a couple of lines to a multi-page letter), but the important thing is keeping the letter upbeat, positive, and gender nonspecific.

Third, we are working on a Veteran Suicide Prevention Project. I sent out a survey asking you and others how to get this job done, assuming money was not a problem. The top three responses were: Housing, Tribalism (vets getting to be with other veterans), and Awareness. Of the three, awareness was the most often mentioned step by far. To that end, we are working on several things to increase awareness, one of which is a phone app that should answer most questions about suicide, including identifying somebody who is contemplating

it and where to go for immediate counseling, and so forth. The App will cost between \$25,000 and \$30,000 to develop initially. Then it requires ongoing funding to maintain and upgrade it.

Along that same line, we are working with our State Legislature to add Michigan to the states with "Green Alerts" for veterans who have gone missing. It would work like a yellow alert for kidnapped children.

Legislation Action!

December 20, 2020, President Trump signed the National Defense Authorization Act for 2021. This bill allocated \$738 billion to the U.S. Military.

H.R. 2568 Vietnam Veterans Liver Fluke Cancer Study Act

The last movement of this bill was on May 29, 2019. This bill was referred to the Subcommittee of Disability Assistance and Memorial Affairs by the Committee on Veterans' Affairs. As of today, Thursday, December 17, 2020, there are 17 co-sponsors to this bill. Tim Walberg (R-I7) is the only Michigan U.S. Congressman to co-sign this bill. If you live in another congressional district, please contact your representative to have him or her co-sign this bill. Our AVVA 310 has widows whose Veteran husbands suffered and died from Liver Cancer. Please consider writing your U.S. Congressional Representative to support this bill in honor and memory of them.

Honoring January Anniversaries on the Wall

Private First Class Walter Edwin McIntire, Jr. was born on October 2, 1943 in Laredo, Texas to Mr. and Mrs. Walter E. McIntire of Ann Arbor, Michigan. Walter graduated in January of 1964 from Ann Arbor High School where he was active in Junior Achievement and was the Vice-President of his J.A. company. He was also active in the Cooperative Occupational Training Program at Ann Arbor High School and worked part-time for S. S. Kresge Company.

Private First Class Walter Edwin McIntire, Jr. began his tour of duty



in Hau Nghia Province, South Vietnam on August 21, 1965 serving as an infantryman with B Company, 2nd Battalion, 503rd Infantry, 173rd Airborne Brigade. On September 18, 1965, Walter earned a Purple Heart when he was wounded by shrapnel in his leg. He recovered from those wounds and returned to his unit four week later. On January 2, 1966, Walter was killed by small arms fire in action near the Bien Hoa Air Base.

Walter Edwin McIntire, Jr. is survived by his parents, three brothers and two sisters. He lived 22 years and 3 months. He is resting in Washtenong Memorial Park in Ann Arbor, Michigan. Walter's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ann Arbor. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 04E Line 051.



Warrant Officer John David Eddy

was born on March 1, 1950 to Mr. and Mrs. Delvord Eddy of Ann Arbor, Michigan. John is a 1968 graduate of Pioneer High School in Ann Arbor. He loved team sports, the out-of-doors, and camping trips to Lake Huron when he was young. John's ambition was to fly. Warrant Officer Eddy enlisted in the Army in 1970. He completed helicopter flight training at Fort Wolters, Texas. He went through



advanced flight training at Fort Rucker, Alabama. Warrant Officer John David Eddy began his tour in An Xugen Province, South Vietnam on June 16, 1971. John was the copilot of a helicopter gunship when it was struck by enemy gunfire and crashed. Warrant Officer Eddy died with three other crew members on January 11, 1972. Warrant Officer John David Eddy earned the Air Medal for herosim, the Bronze Star Medal, the Purple Heart, Air Medal, National Defense and Vietnam Service Medals and the Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal. The South Vietnamese Government presented him with the Military Merit Medal and Gallantry Cross with Palm.

John David Eddy is survived by his parents, a wife, two daughters and a son, and two sisters. He lived 21 years, 10 months and 10 days. His name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ann Arbor. He is also listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 02W Line 096.

Warrant Officer Michael Woodrow Hunter was born on January 23, 1944 in Durham, North Carolina to Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow W. Hunter of Ann Arbor, Michigan. Michael is a 1962 graduate of Ann Arbor High School. He also attended Western Michigan University.

Georgia. He

was trained as a paratrooper and a helicopter pilot. Michael received his Wings as an Army Aviator in April of 1968 graduating tenth in his class. He began his tour of duty in Phuoc Long Province, South Vietnam on July 14, 1969 serving as a helicopter co-pilot on an AH-1G with C Troop, First Squadron, Ninth Cavalry, First Air Cavalry Division. Michael was killed on January 28, 1970 when the helicopter he was co-piloting was struck by enemy anti-aircraft fire during a gun run. The aircraft was struck by a 50 cal. round causing the main rotor to separate. He received the Silver Star, Purple Heart and Air Medal. Michael Woodrow Hunter is survived by his parents, two sisters, and his son. He lived 26 years and 5 days. He is resting in the Swedish Mission Cemetery located in Centerville Township, Leelanau County, Michigan. Michael's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ann Arbor, His name also appears on the Vietnam

Panel 14W Line 075.

Major George Frederick Vlisides was born on December 31, 1924 in Detroit, Michigan to Mrs. Elena



Vlisides of Ann Arbor, Michigan. George is a 1943 graduate of Ann Arbor High School. George enlisted in the Army Air Corps, and received his Second Lieutenant's commission and Bombadier Wings in 1944. He flew heavy bombers, but never made it overseas. He graduated from the Military Academy at West Point near the top of his class in 1950 where his classmates called him, "Gorgeous One." George enlisted in the Air Force after graduation from West Point. He earned a Distinguished Flying Cross, the Bronze Star Medal and the Air Medal with two clusters flying 84 missions in the F-84 during the Korean War. He graduated from the Air Command and Staff College in 1961. Major Vlisides began his tour of duty in Bien Hoa Province, South Vietnam on November 5, 1964 serving with the 1st Air Commando Squadron, 34th Tactical Group, 13th Air Force. George earned another Air Medal in Vietnam. He also was shot down twice with the last time occurring on December 29, 1964. He celebrated his 40th Birthday on December 31, 1964. George died on January 27, 1965 when his A-1E Skyraider crashed in a landing attempt at Bien Hoa Airfield. He earned another Distinguished Flying Cross and two more Air Medals during his tour. George Frederick VIsides is survived by his mother, a brother and a sister. He lived 40 years and 26 days. He is resting in the Greek Orthodox Cemetery in Ann Arbor, Michigan. George's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ann Arbor. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 01E Line 084.

Corporal Eddie Wallace was born on January 12, 1949 in Birmingham, Alabama to Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Lee of Ypsilanti, Michigan. Eddie graduated from Ypsilanti High School in 1968. He worked for Gar Wood Industries before enlisting in the Army in

serving as a Petroleum Supply Specialist with the 271st Assault Support Helicopter Company, 307th Aviation Battalion, 164th Aviation Group, 1st Aviation Brigade. Eddie was killed on January 13, 1969 when a hand grenade was thrown at him while he was on guard duty. Eddie had been "In-Country" for only 23 days. Eddie Wallace is survived by his parents, four brothers and a sister. He lived 20 years and 1 day. Eddie is resting in Westlawn Cemetery in Inkster, Michigan. Eddie's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ypsilanti. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 35W Line 086.

Private First Class Michael Dean Cribelar was born on June 27, 1949 to Mr. Woodrow Dean Cribelar and Mrs. Virginia Cribelar. Michael attended Willow Run High School in Ypsilanti, Michigan. He worked for Ford Motor Company at the Ypsilanti Plant prior to entering the Army on June 9, 1967. Private First Class Cribelar completed Basic Training at Fort Knox, Kentucky. He began his tour of duty in Pleiku Province, South



as an infantryman with B Company, 2nd Battalion, 8th Infantry, 4th Infantry Division on November

22, 1967. Michael was killed on January 11, 1968 from small arms fire after being "In-Country" for one month and eleven days. Michael Dean Cribelar is survived by his parents, his wife and twoyear old son, and two sisters. He lived 18 years, 6 months and 14 days. He is resting in Washtenong Memorial Park in Ann Arbor. Michigan. Michael's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ypsilanti. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 34E Line 028.

Private First Class Larry Gene Gray was born on March 19, 1945 in Missouri to Mr. and Mrs. Robert Gray. Larry is a 1963 graduate of Dundee High School located in Dundee, Michigan. Private First Class Gray entered the

Army on July 18, 1966 receiving his Basic Training and Cook's School at Fort Knox, Kentucky. Larry began his tour of duty in Hau Nghia Province, South Vietnam

on January 5, 1967 serving as a Food Service Specialist with Headquarters, Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion, 5th Infantry, 25th Infantry Division. He was killed on January 17, 1967 when the helicopter he was riding on during a combat support mission disintegrated in flight. He



was "In-Country" for only 12 days. Larry Gene Gray is survived by his wife, his parents, a brother

and three sisters. He lived 21 years, 9 months and 28 days. He is resting in the London Township Cemetery located near Milan, Michigan. Larry's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Milan. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 14E Line 044.

Recognizing a 310 Chapter Member



Billy James Johnson lost his life and identity when the ship he called home was attacked on Dec 7, 1941. This is the story of how he and 270 of his shipmates got their names back.

As of November 2020 the Defense POW / MIA Accounting Agency has given back the names to 270 of USS Oklahoma's unidentified. His case highlighted the complexity of the project, as the fragments that made up his final remains were found in several different caskets. Because of the Covid-19 we are not allowed to make our annual Christmas patient room visits this year. However, our successful fundraising this year has made it possible for us to continue passing on gifts to the hospitalized patients.

Today I discussed the following with Stephen Sparr, Voluntary Services Director.

Monday, December 21st, 9:30am, pick up embroidered shirts at Unique A-Peel. Linda Colby, wife of deceased VVA 310 member David Colby, owns the shop located at 1675 Plymouth Road, Ann Arbor. It is located in the corner of an L-shaped two-story shopping area. This should mean at least two vehicle loads of large boxes;
