Financially:

We are on reasonably sound footing. We rely primarily on donations (tax deductible – we are a 501c-19 tax ID 38-2931801), and our donors have been generous of late. Most of the donations come as a result of our year-end appeal; and, that money goes 100% to the Restricted Fund, which is only used to help veterans.

- The Charles S. Kettles VA Medical Center in Ann Arbor, where we provide underwear, pajamas, shirts, upgraded meals, and more.
- The Fisher House, providing hotel-like rooms for the families of veterans who are patients at the VA hospital.
- WACU -Warriors and Caregivers United, assisting veterans and their caregivers.
- Michigan Ability Partners, helping veterans with the resources they need to be productive members of society.

None of the Restricted Fund money goes to run our Chapter.

Our merchandise sales opportunities have been limited by Covid-19, but we have been quite successful where we could sell.

Last year's Pig Roast was a big help, and we have high hopes for this year.

We get other donations which go to the General Fund or the Memorial Fund or other special projects. We are struggling a little to pay for the improvements at the Memorial; but, in the long view, we have a Perpetual Fund to maintain it when we are gone.

At every meeting we talk about helping veterans in one way or another.

In 1986, as we were forming our VVA 310 Chapter, we established a few Chapter goals. One goal was to erect a memorial to honor and remember our local fallen Vietnam War brothers.

We established our Memorial Committee in late 1988. We six original members were divinely guided in the creation of our Washtenaw County Vietnam Veterans Memorial. We started with a blank page but with a passion that would not let us fail. We met every week for two years, planned, investigated, designed, and raised money.

Fast forward to the 31st Memorial Day observance at our Memorial last weekend. After the observance, I was talking with fellow original committee member Dennis Davie. We were admiring the Memorial site with the Flags and crosses around the walkways. Al Merritt, Jon Luker, and their work Team members did a fantastic job setting up and preparing the Memorial for the special weekend.

Dennis and I agreed that, when we began back in 1988, our grandest vision for this Memorial could not compare with how beautiful it has become today. We all must take pride in how our fallen brothers are remembered in this beautiful site. Our fallen brothers are probably looking down with great pride in our work and achievement. Thank you to everyone who has ever worked to make it so beautiful.

Honoring June Anniversaries on the Wall

Second Lieutenant Philip Matt Crane II was born on January 29, 1947, to Mrs. Howard P. Gragg and the late Philip M. Crane of Ypsilanti. Philip played the accordion when he was very small. He played Little League Baseball. Philip is a 1965 graduate of Ypsilanti High School where he played on the varsity tennis team, was a member of the varsity debate team, and a member of the National Honor Society. He worked all during high school and college at the A&P Store. He went on to attend the University of Michigan until he enlisted in the Army on February 1, 1967. He completed Officer Candidate School at Fort Benning, Georgia.



Second Lieutenant Crane began his tour in Vinh Long Province, South Vietnam on May 14, 1968 serving as a Tactical Intelligence Staff Officer on Advisory Team 52, Headquarters, Military Assistance Command Vietnam (MACV). Lieutenant Crane was flying in a helicopter as a special observer when a flare ignited inside the air-

craft causing him to fall from the aircraft on June 26, 1968. He was "In-Country" for one month and 11 days. Philip Matt Crane II is survived by his mother, his wife, and a sister. He lived 21 years, 4 months and 27 days. He is resting in Crestwood Memorial Gardens in Flint, Michigan. Philip's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ypsilanti. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 54W Line 002.

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Major Frank Rudolph Maki was born on March 13, 1928 in Rudyard, Michigan to Mr. Victor and Mrs. Lemple Ann Maki. Frank graduated from Rudyard High School before enlisting in the Army in 1946 where he completed his Basic Training at Fort Lee, Virginia. He



took part in the Berlin
Airlift serving at the
Rhein Main Air Base as
an Air Ground Liaison
NCO. He returned from
Germany and spent
some time as a civilian
before returning to the
Army in 1950 where
he served with the
7th Infantry Division
in Korea as a rifle and
weapons squad leader.
Sergeant Maki accepted

a reserve commission as a Second Lieutenant while serving in the Korean War. He continued to serve in the Regular Army as an NCO, as he was promoted as a reserve officer. Since Korea, Frank served with the 821st Engineer Aviation Battalion at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri then serving with the 820th Engineer Aviation Battalion at Michigan State University as a military science instructor. According to the Battalion History of the Army ROTC Battalion at Eastern Michigan University, "in 1961, he taught ROTC at Eastern Michigan University for four years, where he led the rifle team to the championship and served as an advisor to Arm of Honor Fraternity. During this time, he accepted his promotion to Captain even though he was rated number one on the list to be promoted to Sergeant Major. He then served as a Company Commander at Fort McClellan where his troops would earn four consecutive Best Company awards." Major Maki began his tour of duty in Quang Tri Province, South Vietnam on May 7, 1971 serving as an Advisor, Advisor Team 3, Headquarters, Military Assistance Command Vietnam (MACV) Advisors, MACV. Captain Maki was killed in action at Fire Support Base Fuller in Quang Tri Province while coordinating medical aid to wounded soldiers on June 22, 1971 during his third tour in Vietnam. He was then posthumously promoted to Major.

Award of The Silver Star for gallantry in action: Captain Maki distinguished himself by gallantry in action on 20 - 22 June 1971 while serving as Senior Advisor to the 1st Battalion, 2d Regiment, 1st Infantry Division, Army of the Republic of Vietnam at Fire Support Base Fuller in Quang Tri Province. Captain Maki heroically participated in the defenses of Fire Support Base Fuller by accompanying and assisting his Vietnamese counterpart against the North Vietnamese Army thrust. After more than two continuous days of intensive direct and indirect fire and ground attacks, the NVA managed to breech the defenses. Captain Maki then directed many tactical air strikes and aerial rocket artillery against the enemy. During this time he continued to reappraise the tactical situation, adjust supporting fires and coordinate medical aid to the wounded Vietnamese soldiers. Though he had been sixty hours without rest, he continued to assist his counterparts up until the moment he was mortally wounded by an enemy artillery round. His extraordinary example of leadership and valiant courage radiated throughout the Fire Support Base and inspired the Vietnamese to repulse the enemy attack. Captain Maki's conspicuous gallantry in action was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.

Frank Rudolph Maki is survived by his wife, son, two daughters, his father, two sisters and two brothers.
He lived 43 years, 3 months and 9 days. He is resting in Highland Cemetery in Ypsilanti, Michigan. Frank's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ypsilanti. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 03W Line 086.

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Corporal Richard Mark O'Neal was born on May 22, 1948 to Mr. and Mrs. William O'Neal of Ann Arbor, Michigan. Richard is a 1966 graduate of Ann Arbor High School. He entered the Marine Corps on July 6, 1966 going through Marine Corps Boot Camp at Ma-



rine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego, California. He received his Advanced Infantry Training at Camp Pendleton, California before being stationed with the Headquarters and Service Company, First Marine Brigade in Hawaii.

Corporal O'Neal began his tour of duty in Quang Tri Province, South Vietnam on May 31, 1968 serving as a rifleman with

E Company, 2nd Battalion, 3rd Marines, 3rd Marine Division, III Marine Amphibious Forces. Richard died on July 26, 1968 of head injuries suffered in a truck accident.

Richard Mark O'Neal is survived by his parents, a brother and four sisters. He lived 20 years, 2 months and 4 days.

According to a posting by Richard's nephew, "I never had the chance to meet you but I just wanted to say that I love you and I appreciate everything that you did for our country. Your brother named me in honor of you. I hold your name in high regard and I continue to work harder every day to be the best person I can be. Every day I wake up is a chance to become better than I was the day before. I have been fortunate enough to marry the woman of my dreams and, thanks to the people that matter to me the most, I have been able to work hard enough to receive my B.A. in Journal-

ism-Public Relations from SHSU. Thank you to everyone on here that has posted something, it was moving to read events that happened in his life. Uncle Richard, I will continue to hold our name in the highest honor. I love you and I will meet you some day."

Richard is resting in United Memorial Gardens in

Plymouth, Michigan. Richard's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ann Arbor. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 50W Line 015.

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H. Neil Stehle was born on March 30, 1945 to Mr. and Mrs. Herbert H. Stehle in Ann Arbor. Neil is a 1963 graduate of Ann Arbor High School where he was on



the gymnastics team. He attended Eastern Michigan University majoring in psychology prior to entering the United States Army on April 29, 1967. Specialist 4 H. Neil Stehle completed his basic training, and radio and communications courses at Fort Knox, Kentucky. He went to Fort Benning, Georgia where he received training at the paratroop school. Neil

was sent to Vietnam on December 13, 1967 where he was assigned to B Company, First Battalion, 503rd Infantry, of the 101st Airborne Division. On June 3, 1968, Specialist 4 Stehle was serving in Thua Thien Province in South Vietnam when he was wounded by small arms fire. Neil was transported to a hospital in Japan where he died of his wounds on June 11, 1968. He lived 23 years, 2 months and 11 days.

H. Neil Stehle is resting in Washtenong Cemetery in Ann Arbor. He is survived by his parents and two sisters including seven nieces and nephews. Neil is listed under Ann Arbor on the Ypsilanti Township Vietnam Memorial and is located on Panel 58W Line 027 on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC.

When the soldiers came home from Vietnam, there were no parades, no celebrations. So they built the Vietnam Memorial for themselves.

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Memorial Day Weekend Recap

As Chapter member and National VVA President Jack McManus encouraged us before Memorial Day weekend, "Never again will one generation of veterans abandon another." This VVA National motto is essentially the same as that found on the cover of this *Dispatch*. McManus continues . . . "VVA has built a legacy of veterans working for veterans who honor and memorialize their service."

Our Chapter lives that mission statement and legacy, especially on Memorial Day weekend. Much work and time led up to the Sunday evening Watchfire, the Saline Parade, and the Observance at our Vietnam Memorial. (Photos of all these events can be seen on the VVA310.org website.)

Weeks before the official dedication of the names and bricks for the four Chapter members who have died since last Memorial Day, the bricks were ordered, then carefully placed and covered in the arch walkway at the Memorial. The bricks arrived in time to be displayed on Memorial Day as part of the Observance. Family members of the four deceased were contacted and invited to be part of the dedication of these bricks.

Weeks and days before Memorial Day, work teams were at our Memorial. AVVA members Corrine Gignac, Bonnie Hall, Kate Kirkpatrick, and Jane Kinzinger planted colorful petunias in May. Al Merritt, Memorial Grounds Maintenance Leader, had his teams and other volunteers lay new mulch, cut away dead limbs, edge the walkway, and polish the Memorial. Construction of the Maintenance Building was completed. As he has done for many years, Pat Lubomski checked the generator and set up the entire sound system. He also practiced singing to lead the "Star Spangled"

Banner" with Annette Kramer. Jon Luker and Al Merritt led the 30-day effort to place 22 crosses a day along Veterans Drive. The trailer, the crosses, and the lights all had to be put in place for suicide awareness. Someone made sure the flags flying at the Memorial were in good condition. Someone made sure the flags for the five branches of the military [was Space Force there too?] were in order to be displayed at the Memorial after being on Steve Hitte's truck for the Saline Parade. Ypsilanti Township Supervisor, Brenda Stumbo, instructed her staff to place 76 American flags along Veterans Drive.

Burn barrels were placed near the Memorial for the Watchfire the evening before Memorial Day. Wood was collected to the start the fire and cook the hot dogs. George Perrault brought hundreds of flags, which had been collected to be retired due to their tattered, worn, and faded condition. Many Chapter members and friends carefully placed a flag in the fire in remembrance of a deceased veteran. Alice Lee, Sandra Martinez, and Carol Talbot were the first to retire a flag in memory of their deceased husbands, who were Chapter members. Wendy Hibbitts stuck around until nearly 2:00 am to be sure the fire was completely extinguished.

Early on Memorial Day morning, parade participants gathered in Saline to be part of the procession down Michigan Avenue. Tim Driscoll followed four young cadets in his van to lead the way. Bonnie Hall and Jane Kinzinger carried the VVA banner. They wore shirts saying, "Stand Up and Respect Your Flag." A small group marched behind them. Steve Hitte drove his truck adorned with flags and transported those members who were unable to march. VVA President Stan Harrison followed in his truck to complete the VVA 310 contingency. As all were assembled in the cemetery, Tim Driscoll commenced the ceremony and introduced the speakers, Army General, and Saline Mayor. Stan Harrison had the honor of placing the VVA wreath on the grave of Russell Michalke, who was killed in Vietnam and one of the 76 young men listed on our Memorial. The Saline Band played, and the Washtenaw County Honor Guard performed the Rifle Salute, with "Taps" being played by two high school students. At the conclusion of the program, all were invited to the Saline American Legion for a tasty lunch prepared by Legion members.

Driving from Saline to Ypsilanti Township, we were reminded of many times before, 31 times to be exact,

when we went to our Vietnam Memorial where we read the names of the 76 young men from Washtenaw County. The program started with "God Bless America" being played by Bagpiper Thom Kennedy. While attendees traditionally braved the sun to sit in front of the Memorial to hear the speaker, most choose now to put their lawn chairs under the mature trees to the west, which provide welcomed shade. Several benches are also available in the well-manicured area in front of the new maintenance building, which will house lawn equipment.

Kate Melcher, Executive Director of Fisher House of Michigan and Army helicopter pilot, addressed the crowd of approximately 150 with her thoughts on Memorial Day. Al Merritt read the Memorial plaque written by Tom Fifield, telling the purpose of our Memorial. Wendy Dumsch-Hibbitts, daughter of the late Paul Dumsch, read his poem "I Knew Them All." This poignant poem was followed by Marv Rivers' reading of those killed in Vietnam on our Memorial. The Memorial Bricks were dedicated by Reverend Gordon Moore in honor of David Brown, Lloyd Lee, Hal Dotson, and Michael Samar, Chapter members who died since last Memorial Day. The program concluded with the Rifle Salute by the County Veterans Honor Guard. The program closed with Thom Kennedy playing "Taps" on his bagpipe. Thus ended a very busy Memorial Day weekend. Much hard work and thought went into making it one of the most meaningful observances in the area and the most important for all Vietnam Veterans, according to Stan Harrison, VVA 310 President, who was the Observance Master of Ceremony. Be sure to thank those involved in making it all happen.
