Officer Reports:

President's Report: This month's report is a report by Jon Luker on the Future of VVA as discussed at the recent Michigan State Council meeting. See it online at <https://vva310.org>.

Finance Report: Bourne. Reports were emailed to the board. Reports are also available to members via email upon request. The Board of Directors approved a proposed budget. You may request a copy. Copies will also be attached to the agenda for next month's meeting.

Non-restricted Fund Revenue

\$135 merchandise sales and \$8 donation at Ann Arbor VA with \$63 cost of goods sold for a 53% profit margin on merchandise sales before a \$27 or 20% fee to AA VA.

Non-restricted Fund Expenses:

\$11,776 non-capitalized expenses for Vietnam Memorial Long-term Landscaping project.

\$445 for Dawn Farm Thanksgiving Dinner. Meijer Ann Arbor-Saline Rd donated \$250.

Restricted Funds Revenue:

\$11,470 Christmas Program Fund.

\$564 donations to Deployed Troops Fund.

Restricted Funds Expenses:

\$866 for Deployed Troops Fund, primarily postage

\$560 maintenance expenditures for the Vietnam Memorial.

AVVA Report: The AVVA report is being emailed separately to those who request it. We are back to meeting at night. We are still selling wrist bracelets for our annual fundraiser.

Committee Reports:

Merchandise: We held our sale at the VA on Black Friday as the VA requested. The sales were dismal - \$135 gross. We can't do sales on Tuesdays anymore since the new boss decided to only use vendors that can occupy the entire week. We are signed up for the next 3 Fridays.

Washtenaw County Council of Veterans: We met last month and discussed the annual dinner that will be held at the Saline American Legion on 8 May.

Michigan State Council: VVA National President Tom Burke was present. See the President's report on the website for details. President Burke said that he will do everything in his power to help VVA exist in some form into the future, working with other organizations as necessary. We need to start thinking seriously about this now, for financial, among other reasons. Our 2024 expenses for the year exceed our revenue by one million dollars. All four of our primary fundraising efforts were adversely impacted by changes in the tax laws that mean that over 70 percent of individual taxpayers take the standardized deduction, meaning that they get no



advantage from donating to nonprofits.

Members and chapters should be thinking about what is most important for the VVA National and their Chapter to be doing in the future.

We are hosting the next council meeting here on 14 March.

Memorial Maintenance: Water is off now. We have switched to winter maintenance.

Website: We had 503,827 hits since the website was last rebuilt.

Membership: Membership is holding steady at 227.

Newsletter: Nothing new.

Health Care: We still don't know what Congress intends to do with the VA. All we know for sure is things will be different.

LTCCSKMC: The Christmas program at the VA will be held on 16 December. Meet in the lobby at 1730. We will be passing out embroidered shirts. Santa and Stacey Mason will be there.

We expect the Christmas fundraiser to bring in about \$19,000, most of which goes to the VA in the form of clothes and upgraded dinners. Some goes to the Ann Arbor Fisher House.

New Business: None.

Driscoll: What about the honor guard? Answer: The board discussed this issue and has decided to create an Honor Guard Committee and to carry insurance on the work the Honor Guard does. The Honor Guard needs younger people to volunteer if the program is to continue. Honor Guard members do not need to be VVA members.

Wilson: I spoke with Jack McManus recently. He went from getting over one hundred phone calls a day, to no calls for the past two weeks. Feel free to contact him.

- 1) Be aware of any postcard you get claiming you owe money for overpayment of benefits or anything similar. If you get one, report it to both MVAA and our State Attorney General.
- 2) Our sock drive is short of our goal, but we gave 1500 to the VA and 250 pairs to the female veterans standdown
- 3) We sent out our letters for veterans to each hospital in the state and to two veteran homes
- 4) On Christmas Day, we will be holding an event here for veterans. We will feed them and hand out a gift bag that will include many things including gift cards from Meijer's. Thank you, volunteers, for helping with this event. VCAT is helping to fund the event. VFW is providing space rent free.

Private First Class Daniel John Illi was born on December 6, 1945 to Mr. and Mrs. Erwin G. Illi at St. Joseph's hospital in Ann Arbor, Michigan. Daniel graduated from Ann Arbor High School in 1964.

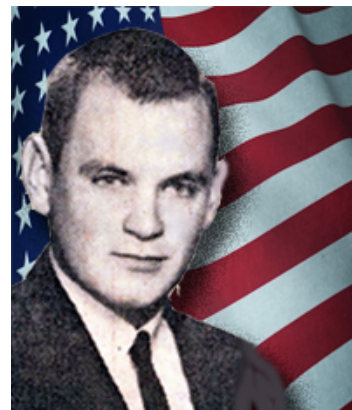
Daniel served with B Company, 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry, 1st Cavalry Division operating out of An Khe, Binh Dinh Province, South Vietnam. Daniel was killed by small arms fire on November 1, 1966.

His name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ann Arbor. He is also listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 12E Line 002.

Private First Class Donald B. Roddy was born on March 7, 1943 to Mr. William Roddy of Gloversville, New York and Mrs. Mary B. Woolfenden of Ann Arbor, Michigan. Donald is a 1962 graduate of Ann Arbor High School.

As a member of the 'Lost Patrol' of Bravo Company, 1st Battalion, 7th Cavalry, he lost his life along with the rest of his machine gun crew as they fought to cover the withdrawal of their fellow troopers to safer ground.

Donald's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ann Arbor. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 03E Line 061.



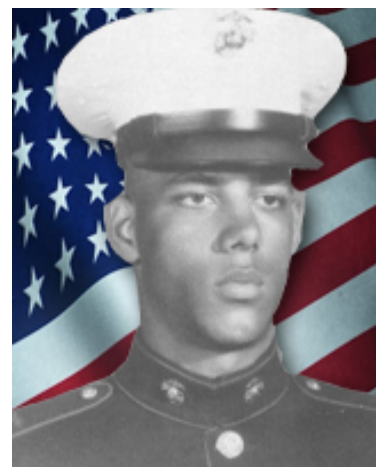
Private First Class Robert Allen Albertson was born on January 1, 1947 in Ypsilanti, Michigan to Mr. and Mrs. Vern Albertson. Robert graduated from Ypsilanti High School in 1966.

Robert died as a result of small arms fire on November 4, 1967 after being In-Country for only 23 days.

His name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial located in Ypsilanti Township under Ypsilanti. Robert's name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 29E Line 018.

Private First Class Robert Clarence Skinner was born on June 21, 1951 to Mr. and Mrs. Skinner. Robert attended Ypsilanti High School in Ypsilanti, Michigan. Private First Class Skinner began his tour of duty in Quang Nam Province, South Vietnam on September 27, 1969 serving as a Motor Vehicle Operator. Robert was killed on November 16, 1969.

Robert's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ypsilanti. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 16W Line 086.

Engineman Third Class Robert Edward Kushmaul, Jr. was born on August 9, 1948 in Adrian, Michigan to Mr. Robert E. and Mrs. Maxine De Verna Kushmaul. Robert is a 1966 graduate of Chelsea High School.

He was killed while on a river boat patrolling on the Song Hkau Giang River South of Siagon on November 16, 1969 from a rocket explosion.

Robert's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Chelsea. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 16W Line 084.

Sergeant Rickie D. Sparks was born on July 26, 1947 in Beecher City, Illinois to Mr. and Mrs. Sam Sparks from Manchester, Michigan. Rickie is a 1965 graduate of Clinton High School in Clinton, Michigan.

Rickie was killed on November 18, 1967 as a result of multiple fragmentation wounds.

Rickie's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Manchester. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 30E Line 019.



Private First Class Donald George Bousley was born on March 18, 1949 in Ann Arbor, Michigan to Mr. and Mrs. Ferris G. Bousley. Donald is a 1968 graduate of Ann Arbor High School.

Donald was killed by enemy small arms fire during an ambush on December 22, 1968 just one month and two days after arriving "In-Country".

Don is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 36W Line 063.

Private First Class Paul Quammen Etter was born on January 12, 1946 to Mr. and Mrs. Lester F. Etter of Ann Arbor, Michigan. Paul is a graduate of University High School in Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Paul was killed by small arms fire on December 8, 1968 just two months and six days into his tour of duty "In-Country".

Paul's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ann Arbor. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 37W Line 063.

Sergeant Dannie Lewis Johnson was born on September 28, 1946 to Mr. and Mrs. James W. Johnson of Ypsilanti, Michigan. Dannie is a December, 1965 graduate of Willow Run High School in Ypsilanti, Michigan.

He was killed on December 30, 1967 just a month into his second tour of duty in South Vietnam. He was killed when a mortar round exploded on his position as he was directing artillery support.

Dannie's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ypsilanti. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 33E Line 003.



Sergeant First Class Grady Merrill Jordan was born on July 25, 1915 in Benton, Arkansas. Grady served in World War II and the Korean War.

Grady began his tour of duty in Bien Hoa Province, South Vietnam on March 1, 1967 as a Heavy Construction Equipment Operator serving with A Company, 169th Engineering Battalion, 159th Engineering Group, 20th Engineering Brigade. Grady took his own life on Christmas Eve of 1967.

Grady Merrill Jordan is the oldest person to die in Vietnam that is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township. He lived 52 years 4 months and 29 days.

He is listed under Ypsilanti. Grady is resting in the Fort Leonard Wood Post Cemetery in Pulaskey County, Missouri. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 32E Line 056.
