Specialist 4 Stanley James Thompson was born on December 2, 1942 in Ann Arbor, Michigan to Mr. James B. and Mrs. Mildred Thompson. Stanley is a graduate of Ann Arbor High School and the Alexandra School of Cosmetology. He was also a former Washtenaw County Junior Deputy. He entered the Army and spent two years in Germany before re-enlisting in 1962.

Specialist 4 Thompson began his tour of duty in Binh Duong Province, South Vietnam, on September 21,



1965. with 3rd Platoon, Company, 1st Battalion, 16th Infantry, 1st Infantry Division. Stanley was killed on February 1966 when he

stepped on a Viet Cong land mine. Stanley James Thompson is survived by his parents and wife. He lived 23 years 2 months and 2 days. Stanley's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ann Arbor. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 05E Line 001.

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Warrant Officer James Eugene Kirby was born on October 27. 1941 to Mr. and Mrs. Grover P. Kirby of Ann Arbor, Michigan. James graduated from Ann Arbor High School in 1958. James Kirby was a professional serviceman serving in the Marine Corps for four years before enlisting in the Army in November of 1964. He attended jump school at Fort Benning, Georgia, and later attended Air Force Flight school at Fort Rucker, Alabama. Warrant Officer Kirby was assigned to the 203rd Aviation Company, 223rd Aviation Battalion, 17th Aviation Group of the First Aviation Brigade in Phu Hiep, Binh Dinh Province, South Vietnam.

Warrant Officer James Eugene Kirby began his tour of duty in Vietnam on November 2, 1968. James was flying a mission on February 11, 1969 when his aircraft was hit by enemy antiaircraft fire and the aircraft crashed killing James instantly.

James Eugene Kirby is survived by



his parents. his wife, a son, and a daughter. He lived 27 years, 3 months and 14 days. **James**

resting in the Bethlehem Cemetery in Ann Arbor, Michigan. His name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial located at the Ypsilanti Township Hall under Ann Arbor. He is also listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 32W Line 013.

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Captain Clark Newell Woodworth, Jr. was born on September 19, 1934 in Ann Arbor, Michigan to Clark and Rose Woodworth, Sr. Clark graduated from Ann Arbor High School in 1952, and from Michigan State University in 1958.

Captain Woodworth, Jr. began his career in the United States Army on January 2, 1959. He was assigned as the Drone Section Commander in the 503rd Aviation Company of the Third Armored Division, United



States Army, Europe (Germany). He was based Airfield. Hanau, Germany f r 0

September, 1961 to January, 1964. He also commanded C Company Seventh Battalion, Third Training Brigade at Fort Gordon, Georgia from December, 1964 to December of 1965.

Clark began his tour in Vietnam on January, 3, 1966 serving as an advisor with the 10th ARVN Infantry Division, Advisory Team 87, HQ, MACV Advisors, MACV. Captain Clark Newell Woodworth, Jr. was killed on February 28, 1966 as a result of multiple fragmentation wounds in Binh Thuy Province, South Vietnam.

Captain Woodworth, Jr. is survived by his wife and a sister. He lived 31 years, 5 months and 9 days. A memorial fund was set up in Clark's honor. The Woodworth Library is a 40,000 volume library located inside the entrance at Fort Gordon, Georgia which is named in honor of Clark. There is a portrait of Clark that is hung in the library that was painted by Norman Adams.

Clark Newell Woodworth, Jr. is at

rest in Arlington National Cemetery. His name is located under Ann Arbor on the Vietnam Memorial located at the Ypsilanti Township Hall, and is located on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 05E Line 092.

Specialist 4 Larry Adams was born on May 3, 1949 in Detroit, Michigan to Foster Adams and Merlin King. Larry attended Ypsilanti High School prior to enlisting in the Army on January 29, 1967.

Adams went through Basic Training Fliegerhorst at Fort Leonard Wood before attending a helicopter maintenance course at Fort Rucker, Alabama. Larry started his tour of duty in An Kye, South Vietnam in August, 1967. He served with the 229th Assault Helicopter Battalion, 11th Aviation Group, 1st Cavalry Division. Though a helicopter mechanic, Larry was flying as a gunner when the helicopter was struck by small arms fire killing him instantly on February 23, 1968.

> Specialist 4 Larry Adams lived 18 years, 9 months and 20 days. He left behind his parents, a brother and a sister. Larry is resting in United Memorial Gardens in Plymouth, Michigan. His name is located on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ypsilanti. His



name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 40E Line 072.

Private Keith Arthur Stoddard was born on September 20, 1950 to Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth R. Stoddard of Ypsilanti, Michigan. Keith is a 1968 graduate of Ypsilanti High School. After graduation, he worked in the laboratory of the State Highway Department. He entered the Army in March of 1970.

Private Stoddard began his tour of duty in Bien Hoa Province, South Vietnam serving as an Armor Crewman with Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion, 5th Infantry, 25th Infantry Division. Keith was killed on February 1, 1971 due to the accidental self-detonation of an explosive device.



Keith Arthur Stoddard is survived by his parents, one brother and five sisters. He lived 20 years, 4 months and 11 days. He is

resting in Union-Udell Cemetery in Ypsilanti, Michigan. Keith's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ypsilanti. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 05W Line 073.

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Private First Class Roger Dean Bulifant was born on April 6, 1947 to Mr. and Mrs. Forrest L. Bulifant, Jr.. Roger attended Belleville High School in Belleville, Michigan.

Private First Class Bulifant enlisted in the Marine Corps in July of 1965. Roger was serving with F Company, 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines, 3rd Marine Division in the Hue - Phu Bai area of Thua Thien Province, South Vietnam as a rifleman. He died as a result of multiple fragmentation wounds on February 28, 1966.



Roger Dean Bulifant survived by his parents and one sister. He lived 18 years, months and 22 days. Roger's name is listed on

the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ypsilanti. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 05E Line 084.

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Specialist 5 Kenneth Lige Fulton was born on September 7, 1946 to Mr. and Mrs. Lige Fulton, Jr. of Willis, Michigan. Kenneth is a 1964 graduate of Lincoln High School where he was the senior class president and recipient of the Willie Heston Sports Hall of Fame Award as the school's outstanding scholar-athlete. He played football, basketball and track. He attended Eastern Michigan University in Ypsilanti, Michigan prior to entering the Army in 1966.

Specialist 5 Fulton began his tour



of duty in Tay Ninh Province, South Vietnam on February 28, 1967 serving as a Medical

Non-commissioned Officer with B Company, 588th Engineering Battalion, 79th Engineering Group, 20th Engineering Brigade. Kenneth was on a convoy in the Mekong Delta when it was ambushed. He was killed on February 15, 1968 as a result of multiple fragmentation wounds.

According to a posting from Jack Engle, "...a plea for help was made and SP5 Fulton answered the call without concern for himself, as he always had for the last year. 'Doc' did not have to be in the position he was in, he could and should have been in the rear until the area was secured. He had less than 15 days before going back to his earthly home, but yet chose to be where his 'duty' was. Instead, he went to his heavenly home. Going to the aid of a fellow soldier in need, he was killed in action."

Kenneth Lige Fulton is survived by his wife, a daughter and his parents. He lived 21 years, 5 months and 8 days. He is resting in Michigan Memorial Park in Flat Rock, Michigan. Kenneth's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ypsilanti. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 39E Line 047.

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Private First Class Ronald Lee Koch

was born on December 17, 1947 in Ann Arbor, Michigan to Mr. and Mrs. Wilbert Koch of Lima Township, Michigan. Ronald is a 1966 graduate of Chelsea High School in Chelsea, Michigan. He worked for the Larowe Feed Company in Chelsea before entering the Army on March 2, 1967. He receiveed his Basic Training at Fort Knox, Kentucky and Advanced Training at Fort Polk, Louisianna. Private First Class Koch began his tour of duty in Binh Duong Province, South Vietnam on July 27, 1967 serving as an infantryman with A Company, 1st Battalion, 28th Infantry, 1st Infantry Division. Ronald was killed on February 6, 1968 from shrapnel wounds sustained in an



explosion.

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Lieutenant Robert Clarence Marvin was born on February 10, 1940 in Boone, Iowa to Mr. and Mrs. Clarence R. Marvin of Dexter, Michigan. Robert is a 1958 graduate of Greenville High School in Boone, Iowa. Bob earned a Navy Scholarship and attended the University of Michigan where he was a member of the Naval ROTC program. He was commissioned upon graduating in 1962.

Lieutenant Marvin flew 111 missions from the U.S.S. Kitty Hawk before going to the U.S.S. Hancock with VA-115, Task Force 77, 7th Fleet operating in the Gulf of Tonkin, North Vietnam. According to a synopsis written on the POW Network, "On February 14, 1967, Marvin flew an A1H (Skyraider) from the Hancock on a mission. His plane developed trouble shortly after takeoff. He and his wingman turned to return to the carrier, but Bob's engine stalled and cut off all electrical power, so no radio messages were received from him. His wingman tried to set a glide

path to conform to the powerless glide Marvin's plane would be in, but never caught sight of Marvin's plane. The day was overcast. The Navy searched the area for two days but did not find any debris or sign of Marvin or his plane."

Robert Clarence Marvin is survived by his parents, wife, a son, and a brother. He lived 27 years, 3 months and 14 days. He was awarded 10



Air Medals. the National Defense Medal. Navy Commendation Medal and the South Vietnamese Government's Armed Services Expeditionary Medal. Robert's

body was never recovered, but his name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial as "Missing In Action (MIA). His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 15E Line 028.

Specialist 4 Jimmie Sherrill Warren was born on December 30, 1948 to Mr. and Mrs. Sherrill Warren of Milan, Michigan. Jimmie is a 1967 graduate of Dundee High School in Dundee, Michigan. He entered the Army in January of 1968 completing his Basic Training at Fort Knox, Kentucky.

Specialist 4 Warren began his tour of duty in Cu Chi, Tay Ninh Province on August 16, 1968 serving as a Radio Operator with Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 2nd Battalion, 27th Infantry, 25th Infantry Division. Jimmie was killed on February 23, 1969 as a result of enemy small arms fire.

Specialist 4 William David Gouger, Jr. was born on May 3, 1949 to Mr. and Mrs William D. Gouger, Sr. of Ypsilanti, Michigan. William is a 1967 graduate of Lincoln High School. He attended Eastern Michigan University before entering the Army.

Specialist 4 Gouger began his tour of duty in Long An Province, South Vietnam on October 26, 1968 serving as an infantryman with E Company, 2nd Battalion, 60th Infantry, 9th Infantry Division. William was killed on February 11, 1969 from enemy small arms fire. According to a posting by Joseph Bogucki, "I served in Nam with Bill Gouger with Recon 2nd/60th Inf. 9th Inf Div. We called him 'Big G'. An avid



hunter and outdoorsman, Bill was our platoon's unofficial armorer. 'G' was a big man, but as kind and gentle as any you would

ever meet. Rest in Peace, Big G."
William David Gouger, Jr. is survived by his parents and a brother. He lived 19 years, 9 months and 8 days. He is resting in Michigan Memorial Park in Flat Rock, Michigan. William's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Milan. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 32W Line 012.

Local Soldiers: Three Stories, 1969

This is a story of three local soldiers who experienced a terrible day long ago, and recently came together again during their reading of Sacrifices Not Forgotten. It took place at our large U.S. Army base camp at Quan Loi, Vietnam, on May 12, 1969. That day, three local soldiers were in Quan Loi. In the early morning hours that day, there was a massive enemy attack, with sappers inside the perimeter.

Soldier One: Harter

Soldier One was 21-year-old combat engineer James Wilson Harter,



from Dexter, Michigan, who was killed during this attack. James had been incountry for ten months, a short-

timer. As was noted in an Ann Arbor News article, he was awarded the Army Commend-ation Medal for Heroism, "He engaged the enemy with a heavy and accurate volume of automatic weapons fire . . . stalling the enemy and giving his comrades time to reinforce the perimeter line . . . an enemy round detonated inside his position instantly killing him."

Soldier Two: Drake

Soldier Two was twenty-year-old

Ann Arborite Tom Drake. He was a rifleman whose company position on the perimeter was just around the perimeter from where James' unit was. His story of that attack is included in Sacrifices Not Forgotten. There had been skirmishes in the area the previous few days, with an enemy force of 400-500 VC and NVA soldiers. An attack was imminent. Tom describes what happens shortly after midnight on May 12th, as enemy sappers were mistaken for friendly forces by rear echelon soldiers guarding that perimeter area. The sappers just walked in and began blowing up mortar, artillery bunkers and such. It was hours of battle before the enemy was completely terminated, but at a high cost to U.S. forces. It was not until 2013 that Tom found out that James Harter was one of the soldiers killed in that attack.

Soldier Three: Throneberry

Soldier three was twenty-twoyear-old helicopter pilot Dale Throneberry, who today produces the <u>Veterans Radio program</u>. Upon reading *Sacrifices Not Forgotten*, Dale realized he also was there in Quan Loi on May 12th.

They had flown in that morning to support a special operation. His Huey was to be available to respond to any emergency needs of a recon unit that was outside the Quan Loi base. If it had not been for their needing to be there for that unit, Dale and the helicopter crew would not have been there with the possibility of further attacks. As Dale describes it, they flew in that morning to the wreckage of the camp and Hueys flying out the dead and wounded. It was a day he would never forget.

During the day of May 12th, there

was more incoming enemy mortar rounds and rockets. Dale and his helicopter crew spent much of that day in a bunker. Dale reports that it was the most scared he had been in Vietnam. The concern of another ground attack and their not being able to fly out of the area and only being armed with a 38-caliber pistol was not that comforting.

The stories of these three young soldiers, not long out of high school, collided as they experienced death and the nightmare of war on the same day and location, some 10,000 miles away from Ann Arbor. That was May 12, 1969, and Tom and Dale are still here to share it. James Wilson Harter, you are remembered as a hero. Rest in peace.



Vietnam Veterans Memorial: Review and New Plans

 25 January, Acquired new mailing address for the Memorial of 1944 Veterans Memorial Drive, Ypsilanti MI 48197

- February, Made certificates and awards for significant contributors to the Memorial Parking Lot project.
- Developed and circulated a policy stating when the US Flag would be lowered to half-staff.
- Acquired data for value to parking lot in-kind contributions.
- Acquired legal description for Memorial Land Lease.
- Start work with DTE about getting power to the new shed.
- Once the Ford Foundation Grant became unavailable to us, we switched to working with NEW (Nonprofit Enterprise at Work), who offered to help us find better, local grants.
- 15 March. Title Research required by DTE done by Absolute Title
- 13 April, Began work on the Suicide Prevention Demonstration.
- April, Create Lawn Care Crews and begin implementing routine maintenance schedule
- Tried to arrange to have mail addressed to the Memorial forwarded to Jon Luker (required so that Google will put Memorial on the map).
- Acquired bricks for the 10 VVA members in good standing who passed away since Memorial Day 2018
- 4 May, Awarded the previously discussed awards
 and certificates at our annual recognition dinner
- 23 May, Memorial Clean-up Party
- 27 May, Memorial Ceremony
- June, Begin process to get estimates and advice on repairing the Memorial and the podium

- 13 June, Approved motion to use Kettles Memorial Fund to buy a granite bench in his honor to be installed at the Memorial.
- July, Received two full sets of flags from two different Navy ship associations
- August, Suicide Prevention Project Planning finally started to get somewhere.
- 4 Sep through 11 October Suicide Prevention Demonstration
- 8 October, Trimming the grass at the Suicide Prevention Demonstration
- 17 October, Fall Cleanup Day at the Memorial
- Removed bark from bushes and replaced it with egg rock
- Removed spotted rock from beside the Memorial, reclaimed original rock garden shape and placed egg rock
- -- Placed two pallets of bark chips around the trees behind the Memorial
- Cleaned the Memorial and the benches
- -- Weeded and cut back the Memorial garden
- Plus all of the usual maintenance tasks (cutting, weeding, raking leaves, etc.)
- -- October Began search for volunteers to replace 660 crosses and add a foot spike
- 30 October, Repair: Commission Memorial repair work for \$2,495.00
- 23 November, Preliminary approval of Charles Kettles bench.
