Wreathes Across America — by Al "Fredo" Merritt — 16 December 2017

It all started when Morill Worchester was a 12-year old paper boy on a trip to Washington, D.C. Morill visited Arlington National Cemetery and was in awe and never forgot the feeling it left with him. Fast forward to his adult years. With good

luck and wise investments, Morrill and his wife, Karen Worcester, founded Worcester Wreath Company in Harrington, Maine. In 1992, when Morrill had an excess of wreaths, he got the help of Sen. Olympia Snowe to place the excess wreaths on older graves in Arlington. This continued every year until a newspaper printed a picture of the wreaths in 2005, and it exploded with enthusiasm from people and companies across the country, all of them wanting to know how they could help.

The Wreaths Across America (WAA) caravan traveled earlier this month from Columbia Falls, Maine, where the wreaths were made. They went through several states before arriving in Arlington, Va. Some trucks split off along the way to other locations, such as the Great Lakes National Cemetery in Holly, Michigan. Patriot Guard Riders, the main sponsor of the WAA in Michigan, meet every year at the Villagers Family Restaurant in Holly, before the convoy arrives. A Member brings in an American Flag; they recite the Pledge of Allegiance, offer a prayer, and have breakfast. After breakfast, they head to a McDonald's to rendezvous with the wreath convoy escorted by Police, Patriot Guard riders, and Rolling Thunder, driving under outstretched hook-and-ladder fire trucks with a large American Flag. As the escorts and truck convoy pull into the cemetery, the enthusiasm is at a fever pitch, with people clapping, crying, and expressing every other emotion you can imagine.

I have attended this ritual the last nine years. This year, Tim Clarke went with me. After breakfast, we headed to the cemetery and waited for the convoy's arrival. I would estimate there were over 2,000 volunteers. The parking area was packed, and there were cars lined up outside, waiting to get in. The roads inside the cemetery were clear, but around the graves the snow was about knee deep. I have a friend who asked if I would place a wreath on the headstone of her ex-husband for their children, who live outstate. Of course, I gladly agreed. Tim and I placed four wreaths this year. It is an honor I look forward to every year.

A total of 1.2 million wreaths were placed on markers across the country, in over 1200 locations. I will leave you with the Wreaths Across America motto:

"REMEMBER-HONOR-TEACH"

And the Army keeps rolling along!

Historical Outlook

This section will be for thoughts and insights about the historical outlook on the Vietnam War. This is a place where veterans can share their experience of their insights about the significance and meaning of the Vietnam War, from their perspective. The year of 2018 marks half a century of the Tet Offensive. I received order to go to Vietnam in February of 1968—right in the middle of the Tet Offensive—but in the meantime, I was given a commission as a second lieutenant and ended up going the following year, 1969. But I know some of our veterans were in Khe Sanh, Hue, Danang, or other cities attacked during the Tet Offensive. Those stories are precious and should be preserved. If you feel inspired, please share! I will start out by offering my own perspective on the Vietnam War. I hope soon to hear your perspectives.

The Vietnam War: Why the United States Became Involved?

There is nothing like time to impart wisdom. It has been now over 50 years that the United States decided to become enmeshed in Southeast Asia by sending troops to Vietnam. With time comes reassessment and wisdom. So, in this note, I share with my friends my experiences in Vietnam and my interpretation of the Vietnam War for the United States.

Two Wars: The Big and the Little

Very simply, the Vietnam War can be understood only if one sees it as two wars: the Big War and the Little War. The United States won the Big War and transferred the Little War to the South Vietnamese government, which lost it two years later. When I see people struggling to interpret the Vietnam War, I can spot right away their difficulty: They are looking either at the Big War only or at the Little War only. Hence, their difficulty.

How I Got to Vietnam

I arrived in Saigon in the spring of 1969, one year after the Tet Offensive. There were over half a million Americans in Vietnam. Pres. Richard Nixon was in the White House. There were initial talks of troop withdrawal and Vietnamization—that is, the transfer of warring power to the South Vietnamese Government. With a top secret crypto clearance, I worked at the communications hub in Saigon. So, in conversations with the people there, I came to understand the meaning of the Vietnam War both for the Americans and for the South Vietnamese. That was when I understood about the Big War and the Little War.

The Big War

The Big War was a proxy war, that is, a war instigated by China and Russia but without the direct involvement of those two countries. The strategic plan set out the Chinese and Russians to take over the world for Communism consisted of local, proxy wars under the guise of democratic revolutions. Vietnam was their first major test. But the United States was vigilant against Communist strategies and decided very early to intervene and block the Communist take-over of the world.

But no one knew then how to win a proxy war against China and Russia, which had a nuclear arsenal. In retrospect, and using the wisdom that one acquires by examining what happened half a century later, one knows today that the key to victory in the Big War in Vietnam was time. The United States won the Big War in Vietnam—that is, the war against China and Russia—by staying in the fight long enough, that is 12 years. So, here is the answer to the riddle of the Big War in Vietnam: The United States won that war by staying in the fight long enough, receiving every possible form of attack short of nuclear, and never being defeated. The climax of the Big War was the Tet Offensive of 1968, which was an absolute defeat for the North Vietnamese Government.

The Little War

The Little War in Vietnam was the civil war between North and South Vietnam. Eventually, the Vietnamese themselves needed to sort out that war. The United States helped the best they could, but it was up to the South Vietnamese government to reform itself and get the people on its side. So, the United States withdraw its forces from Vietnam in 1973. Two years later, South Vietnam fell under to attack of North Vietnam. The fall of South Vietnam had no meaning for China or Russia. They had lost the momentum in their strategy to dominate the world. Ten years after the fall of Saigon, the Soviet Union unraveled, and the Communist world was liberated. Now, the Vietnamese people themselves are moving to liberate themselves from Communism.
